Notes: (con't) Peter GREGGERS

At 1:30 Sunday afternoon, Oct. 6, 1912 at the family residence, in the presence of a great concourse of sorrowing friends, the last tribute to the memory of Peter Greggers was paid. The rites were of the simplest, in accordance with the simple ways in which Mr. Greggers had lived, but they were very impressive.

Long before the hour for services, the home and yard were crowded with those who expressed their sympathy and sorrow with many beautiful floral tributes and those who wished to pay their respects to one who knew them all as friends. They represented merchants, bankers, officials and laborers, human beings of the same stamp as the man whom they were honoring were there.

The service consisted of music by a quartet accompanied by Miss Agnes Harper. After a prayer by Rev. Stidham, Dr. Robert Jardine gave a scriptural reading and a short but effective sermon. Mr. Greggers was a member of the German Lutheran Church.

At the close of the service the house was thrown open for a steady stream of people passing through and sadly looking upon the features of their friend whom they had loved and honored.

A long line of carriages conveyed the mourners to the Lemonville Cemetery where a vast assemblage of friends and neighbors were awaiting their arrival, and with a final prayer, all that was mortal of Peter Greggers was tenderly laid beside his wife and infant son, who preceded him.

It is not affirming too much to say that no other citizen in Northern Missouri has enjoyed the respect and affection of so many people as he. He made friends readily and held them as with hooks of steel. The news of his death will be read with regret and sorrow by hosts of friends he has made by the kindness of his heart, many charitable acts and wise counsel. His career in life has been unique and the place left vacant by him can never be filled.

Besides the sons and daughters he leaves two sisters, Christina Koch, who resides in Germany and Maria Hansen of Leigh, Neb., who was present at the time of his death.

Captain Peter Greggers was born in the province of Schleswig-Holstein, Germany, August 2, 1837 to Claus and Maria Hansen Greggers. He died at his home in Unionville, Mo, Oct. 4, 1912, age 73 years, 2 months and 2 days.

He came to the United States in the spring of 1856, arriving in Douglas County, Ill. He did farm work and later was a teamster in St. Louis before he enlisted in Co B, 79th Ill Infantry in Aug 1862. His campaign service was in Tennessee and Georgia and included the battles of Stones River (Murfreeboro), Liberty Gap, Chickamauga, Missionary Ridge, Dandridge, the Atlanta Campaign, Resaca, Adairsville, Dallas, Kennesaw Mountain, Peach Tree Creek, Jonesboro, Spring Hill, Franklin and Nashville. He was slightly wounded on the left temple at Stone River, Dec. 31, 1862.

He enlisted as a private and was mustered out of the service after almost three years, having served as First Lieutenant, Brigade Adjutant and Captain of his company.

Once more are we confronted by the foot prints of the "Pale Archer" who has hurled his arrow at the bosom of our friend, Mrs. Peter Greggers, the wife of our worthy Circuit Clerk and Recorder. For weeks she has been confined to her bed suffering intensely while the sands of life were slowly running out. Few realized that death was so near.

Mrs. Greggers was born in Germany, November 23, 1835, and came to this county in the spring of 1856, locating in Illinois, her maiden name being E. Catherina Joens. In 1860 she was married to Mr. Greggers and in the fall of 1865 they located in Jackson township in this county. Seven children were born to them, six of whom, three boys and three girls, are still living.

Mrs. Greggers was a woman kind to all and beloved by all. Her eyes full of tears for every form of distress and her hand full of relief; her life a record of unobtrusive and unselfish good deeds. Our city has lost a noble woman, Mr. Greggers, a devoted helpmate and the sons and daughters a mother whose cherished memory can never die. There is not a heart in Unionville that will not be moved to the keenest sympathy for the bereaved family in this dark hour of affliction. There is not a friend that does not wish that this cup of sorrow need not have been drained. "Tis true the grave in its silence gives forth no voice or whisper of the morrow, but there is a voice borne upon the lips of the morning zephyrs that lets fall a whisper quickening the heart with the knowledge that there is an abode beyond the tomb. We know that our lamps, burning here, are extinguished only to be relighted in that Mansion above."

Her remains were conveyed to Lemon Station on Tuesday and after a brief ceremony laid to rest beside those of her little son in the beautiful cemetery at that place.

headquarters while serving as engineer on the railroad.

Later he moved with his wife to a farm near Lemons, Mo., where they resided until about two years ago, when they moved to Unionville, Mo.

He leaves to mourn his passing his good wife, two brothers, Mr. P. D. and Mr. W. T. Greggers, three sisters, Miss Mary, Miss Adeline and Miss Christina Greggers, all of Unionville. Many other relatives and friends mourn his passing.

Mr. Greggers was a member of the Masonic Lodge of Unionville, No. 210. He was a member of the Methodist church of Lemons, Mo. He was a man of sincere and noble character, worthy of his many and true friends.

Funeral services were held at 3:00 p.m. Sunday, at the home, conducted by L. E. Brown, assisted by W. A. Pollock, Burial at Lemons, Mo.

Peter Detlef GREGGERS

Peter Detlef Greggers son of Captain Peter and Elsebe Catherina Joens Greggers was born near Tuscola, Douglas county, Illinois and departed this life at his home in Unionville, Mo., Dec. 12, 1942 at the age of 79 years,11 months and 3 days. He was preceded in death by his parents and three brothers and is survived by three sisters, Mary, Adeline and Christena R. Greggers all of Unionville.

In the fall of 1866, the parents and family moved from Illinois to a farm located west of Lemons, Putnam county, Missouri, where he resided and attended the public school until the fall of 1879, moving with his parents to the present home in Unionville. He attended the public schools, later going to the Spaulding Business College at Kansas City. Mo, graduating in 1882.

He served as Deputy Circuit Clerk and Recorder under his father's term of office. In March 1887, he was appointed to the position of bookkeeper for the Kansas National Bank located at Wichita, Kansas, which position he filled for two years, later accepting the position of bookkeeper at the First National Bank of Kansas City, Missouri. After a period of two years with the First National, he was again called to the position of cashier and paying teller with the Kansas National Bank of Wichita, Kansas and at the end of three years he returned to his home at Unionville and engaged in farming.

January 1899 he renewed his clerical work as Deputy Clerk and Recorder under Mr. Martin Coleman. In 1902 he was elected to the office of Circuit Clerk and Recorder, serving for a term of four years, after which he again returned to farming.

Again in the autumn of 1910, he was elected to the office of Recorder of Deeds of Putnam county in which capacity he served for eight years.

He was affiliated with the National Bank of Unionville as director and later became President of same. When the Farmers Co-operative Store of Putnam county was organized, he became its president, also serving in the same capacity of the Putnam County Oil Co.

During the World War I he acted as chairman of the Liberty Loan War Drives. Later years of his life were devoted to farm activities.

He became a member of the Lutheran church in early life and at the time of his demise was a member of Unionville Lodge A.F. & A. M. No. 210.

His public career has been irreproachable and his services marked by the cleanest methods. His family and friends were held most dear and no task was ever too severe if it gave comfort or happiness to others.

He was loved and respected by all who knew him, always loyal and unselfish. the community mourns the loss of a friend and neighbor in Mr. Greggers.

Funeral service was held at the Comstock Funeral Home Monday afternoon at 2:30, conducted by Rev. G. W. Swan and by the Masonic order of which he was an ernest member.

Wm. T. Greggers, son of Peter and Elsebe Catherina Joens Greggers was born in Douglas county, Illinois, December 28, 1865 and departed this life at his home in Unionville, Mo., April 16, 1933 being at the time of his death 67 years, 3 months and 18 days of age.

In the fall of 1866 the parents and family moved from Illinois to a farm located west of Lemons, Putnam county, Missouri, where he resided and attended the public school until the fall of 1879, moving with his parents to the present home, Unionville, Mo. Here he finished his growth to manhood, attending the public school of Unionville, graduating from its high school at an early age. During his growing period he was trained in farm work and caring for livestock grown on the farms. While a young man he gave some time to music and later he was engaged by the lowa State band, under the leadership of Prof. Geo. W. Landers, touring the state of lowa and filling a number of important engagements.

Later while still a young man he was engaged as a locomotive engineer and had given considerable of his life to this occupation.

After giving up the railroad service he again entered into the agricultural and stock growing industry with his brothers and sisters and helped materially in superintending and managing of his life to this occupation. He was intensely interested in his work.

His friends were numbered to the extent of his acquaintances and they were endeared to him through his generous and amicable disposition. He was a wonderful brother in many ways and was possessed of a personality that won for him the love and respect of all children.

He was wonderfully noted for his desire to aid and render assistance to his fellow men, for many times he had given much of his time, ability and material values to help others, even during his last sickness, he would ask if there was any thing he could do to help, stressing the foremost thought in his mind, desiring to be of service.

He has been a member of the L.F.& A.M. order since 1892, a member of the O.E.S. since its organization, also a member of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers, besides being interested in different local co-operations.

He was preceded in death by his parents and two brothers.

He leaves to mourn his passing, one brother, P. D., three sisters: Mary, Adeline and Christina R. besides cousins residing in America and Germany.

The funeral was conducted at the home in the east part of town by Rev. G. J. Hunsinger, pastor of the Presbyterian church. The services and arrangements were in charge of the Masonic order and the burial was according to that ritual. The funeral was held at 2:00 Tuesday afternoon after which the body was taken to Lemons for interment in the cemetery there.
